

agaart.online is a not-for-profit member association, run by artist volunteers, to support the promotion of emerging artists.





What do you like about volunteering at the Arts Centre?



Discover the island treasures on Bribie Art Trail

Artists of Bribie is a collective of 15 likeminded artists who've recently formed Bribie Art Trail with Bribie Island Community Arts Centre featuring as 'The Hub'.

They have put together a curated cultural experience for visitors to Bribie and surrounds: abstraction, surrealism, landscape, watercolour, acrylic, acrylic pour, ceramics, pottery, steam punk sculpture, sculptures created from found objects, photography and soul/energy paintings - something for everyone.



Art Trail maps are available at Bribie Island Community Arts Centre and various tourist venues in the area.

What a great new adventure around the island and surrounds for

weekend discovery and meandering. Individual artists open their appointment. Their contact details are on the map.

One of the members of the Artists of Bribie Collective, Studio 511, Bellara, had their official opening last week. Studio 511 is a joint venture of Kelly Vass who creates functional pottery, clay sculptural works and mosaics and Robyn Murphy who makes slip cast ceramics.

More than 60 people attended their opening and enjoyed browsing and buying over drinks and nibbles.

Studio 511 also offers clay workshops throughout the year with highlight classes during the school holidays for young artists from 8 years old.

"My paintings depict my love of light and colour working in a semi-impressionistic style," she says.

I was once asked "what do you like to paint?" My answer was simply "the light and colour."

Light both intrigues and fascinates me, it can be subtle, or it can be brilliant. Light gives energy to my painting subjects no matter how simple that subject may be and draws us out from the darkness into its caress. It guides us, comforts us and bedazzles our senses.




Light gives the universe form, texture, and life, and without light there is no colour.
