

In this workshop we will explore different gelli plate printing techniques including botanical printing, mark making and stencil printing.

Produce lovely layered prints using transparent and opaque paints, using a wide variety of textures, with this easy to learn, and somewhat addictive process.

All materials are supplied including a 20cm x 25cm gelli plate, brayer, paints, papers, stencils, plants & tools.

You will leave the workshop with a series of finished prints and the knowledge to continue this amazing process at home.

The roof has brought welcome Courtyard shade now the heat is back. The beautiful wall mural also reduces the glare off the facing wall of the Centre.



What I've Learnt Lately

I have learnt lately that electric hair curlers are a Danish invention., from watching *Carmen Curlers*, a television series freely inspired by the real trailblazing invention.

Carmen Curlers was founded in 1963 by Arne Bybjerg Pedersen. He had several radio and television shops but saw a newspaper advertisement from a hairdresser who was looking for capital to produce an electric hair curler. Bybjerg joined the project, and

when the hairdresser had difficulty getting his invention to work in practice, he bought the hairdresser out. In the following years, the product became an international success. A few square meters in a basement grew into a modern factory with 3500 employees, mainly women. And yet another discovery ... the sister of my Danish husband, Karsten, worked there for a period.

Bybjerg sold Carmen Curlers to his largest customer, the American Clairol, in 1969 and then immigrated to Australia. His death notice appeared in the Toowoomba Chronicle in 2022 with the words "They all think you are crazy, until you change the world".
