



#### WHAT IS MOMIGAMI PAPER USED FOR?

Anyone who works with paper would appreciate the value and possibilities of momigami.

This technique would be most useful to people who work with paper and fabric, such as book makers/binders, scrapbookers, junk journalers (Junk Journal: A book which is often made through found and recycled materials to be used as a way to collect and record memories, thoughts, ideas, and inspiration), people who make memory books, travel journals, etc.

The momigami paper is quite strong and can be used to cover boxes and stiffened to make sculptural forms. It can be painted, marbled or dyed, and can be sewn by hand or by sewing machine and can be cut into strips

Momigami paper can be torn and applied to canvases to make textural paintings such as landscapes. It is very

## Landmark anniversary for Matthew Flinders Art Prize



The excitement factor for this year's annual gem, the Matthew Flinders Art Prize, has gone up a notch, being the 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary of its inauguration in 1999.

The event was so named, along with the magnificent Bribie Community Arts Centre Gallery in which it's held every January, to mark the anniversary of when Matthew Flinders first sailed up Pumicestone Passage.

It has grown in scope and numbers each year and eagerly anticipated by artists wanting to test their works and art lovers looking to discover and enjoy another art style.

Different judges attend each year and choose the winner according to their own reference and tastes. So, every year, a different take on art across the mediums arises.

Chairman of the organizing committee of MFAP for the past six years, Steph White says the event is the jewel in the crown of BICAS. It is sustained by the artists brave enough to enter, the hanging team and committee members coordinating an assembly of artworks into a comprehensive and inspiring exhibition, BICAS staff and volunteers tying together all the ends to make it sing

and importantly, local businesses and people who support it with sponsorships, raffle ticket purchases, and foot traffic to the Centre during its run.

Lola is recovering and back enjoying her weekly fun at Thursday Painters.


## VALE KEITH BARCLAY
