



The Arts Centre has had a solid financial year to date. Figures for the Café for the year have been increasing steadily and it has reached capacity numbers often. Of course, great outcome for our revenue, but a heavy workload on Corey and our volunteers. Increased sales of artworks and crafts have risen with the number of visitors to the Centre, both singular and on the many bus groups stopping in.



Our good takings have meant we can make improvements like the new admin office refit, which Stacey and the volunteers are enjoying. When our great new groundsman volunteer Colin Neu, wields his paintbrush there next week, it will look a treat.

We're looking forward to some other big improvement works over the December/January period.

The Café will be closing on 17th December re opening in January date to be decided, based on the courtyard renovations.





A recent Bribie Nature Festival gig here, the Pumicestone Piano weekend, was a great success and took the Cafe to a high note.


Pianists came from near and far to show their keyboard skills on a funky painted piano, designed by artist and which she painted with the Bribie Kindergarten children.

Gaye and her committee are in the planning stages and hope to make it a much talked about event -like one she


curated in Bundaberg some years ago.

A student of Gary Crew's writing course on Bribie, he invited his writing mentor to launch the book before a crowd of about 50 family and friends - and fellow writing enthusiasts.

Pete has a plan to follow up with five more volumes of the genre, his favourite in exploring the ways and means humans deal with unexpected and unheard of phenomena.

He has already had pleasing success with the book on Amazon on-line sales worldwide.

The book sells at the Arts Centre for \$17.95 and paperback is also available online and eBook also via Amazon.

I'm really proud of this book. I love the stories because they're fun, entertaining, sometimes serious but always warm-hearted."




Billy Connolly likes his new artist self better than the funny man

Embracing the Nude: Developing your Individual Vision







1. Crossing the Bridge. From the time of our first visit to Bribie Island, the sense of "I'm Home" that comes over you as you cross the bridge, is amazing.

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
